

The Calleen Collection 1977—2019

The Calleen Collection 1977—2019 exhibition comprised the winning artworks from the acquisitive Calleen Art Award, established by Cowra arts patron Mrs Patricia Fagan, OAM in 1977. Each year since the inaugural exhibition, the Calleen Art Award has grown in significance as an acquisitive art prize and is now valued at \$20,000. This has ensured that the Calleen Collection housed at the Cowra Regional Art Gallery is worthy of the broad spectrum of other collections of Australian art in regional public galleries across NSW. The wide-ranging collection exemplifies the diverse and open-ended stylistic trends of Australian art (predominantly painting) over the past forty years.

Previous winning artists of the Calleen Art Award include Mandy Martin, Greg Daly, Claire Martin, Rowen Matthews, Meg Buchanan, David Fairbairn, Yvonne Boag, Peter Gardiner, Wendy Sharpe, Naomi White, G.W. Bot, Gladdy Kemarre and Zai Kuang.



WORKSHOP

23 January to 24 January

Summer Art Workshops for Children

The 2020 Summer Art Workshops were designed by tutors with professional art and/or teaching experience. The workshop program includes a range of art activities for children to explore in a fun environment, as well as allowance for the development of individual skills.

This summer we welcomed local artist Libby Murray to the Gallery for 4 sessions over 2 funpacked days. The Thursday workshops focused on Woven Art using natural and man-made materials, with 7-9 year olds creating small wall hangings and 10-12 year olds creating circular placemats. On Friday, the workshops were based on paper sculptures with 7-9 year olds learning a variety of techniques to create a hanging garland and 10-12 year olds creating a 3D cardboard name or portrait sculpture.



Behind the Lines

Each year, the *Behind the Lines* exhibition features a broad selection of political cartoons from around Australia, providing an insight into the year in Australia politics. It celebrates the role of political cartoonists in Australia and highlights the power that their drawings have in contributing to our daily political and social discourse.

Framed by the world of rock music, under this year's theme song of The Greatest Hits Tour, Australia's leading political cartoonists amped up the satire on 2019's greatest political hits.

The year, *Behind the Lines* featured over 80 artworks of striking artistic quality from over 30 political cartoonists across Australia. From the federal election to the woes of Brexit, no political, party, or policy is safe from the nation's best cartoonists: witty, powerful, or ribald, they have offered in their own inimitable styles an astutely observed journey through twelve months in our political life and the personalities of our politicians.

As far as the eye can see

As far as the eye can see celebrates the contemporary topography of both landscape and printmaking. The exhibition challenges these doubly conventional themes through the work of twenty-two Australian artists whose work reflects the breadth and depth of print practices in Australia today. The artists express their individual relationships to the land through a variety of print media, describing both the vast scale and intimate detail of our diverse natural environment and portraying Australia's unique and varied geography.

From Aboriginal desert story-tellers and knowledge keepers. Through the regional experience of World Heritage sites and journeys from city to country (or simply from place to place), to the urban printmarker's challenge of speaking up in the face of climate change and mining., the common thread running through the exhibition is a deep respect for the land and a desire to continue sharing a meaningful relationship with it. These artists make it clear that in a virtual, digital and mechanical age the need to remain connected to the natural world has never been more urgent.

Obsessed: Compelled to make presented the work of 15 artists from across Australia, delving beyond the finished object, beyond the personality of the maker, into the fundamental conceptual framework of their creations. The exhibition looked at the complexities of their materials and processes, the realities of their day-to-day studio routine and unravel what compels each maker to create over the course of their personal career – Why this technique or material? Why that concept? How does the mind of a maker work?

This exhibition explored the act of making through the framework of obsession – how it consumes us, carrying us along in its wake, colouring every aspect of our lives. With these professional artists, it is their obsessions, and all the associated angst, failures, breakthroughs and milestones, that feeds their productivity and to deliver exceptional outcomes.

Calleen Art Award 2020

The Calleen Art Award was founded as an acquisitive art prize by art patron and collector Mrs Patricia Fagan, OAM and first awarded in 1977. The winning work was to form the nucleus of an art collection for the people of Cowra to be known as '*The Calleen Collection*'.

A significant feature of the Calleen Art Award has been the prevailing trend to focus on painting in any style or subject during the past 43 years, now a condition of entry since 2009.

This year the Calleen Art Award comprises the work of 52 finalists selected from 330 entries from across Australia by a panel of art professionals. The Calleen Art Award 2020 winner, Zoe Young, was announced on Saturday 3 October 2020, via a virtual opening event, on Facebook. A recording of the event is now available to view on the Gallery website. The winner was selected and announced by the Award Judge, Mr Steven Alderton, Director and CEO, National Art School. The winning artist received \$20,000 in prize money courtesy of the Calleen Trust.

Gallery visitors are encouraged to vote for their favourite painting in the Calleen People's Choice Award 2020 (non-acquisitive). The winning artist will be announced at the close of the exhibition and will be awarded \$1,000, courtesy of the Friends of the Gallery.









YVONNE BOAG: Travelling, Leaving, Settling, Scotland, Korea, Australia: Paintings, Works on Paper and Artists Books

For more than 20 years, Yvonne Boag has divided her time between South Korea and Australia, spending seven months each year in Seoul. Dealing with themes of displacement and alienation, this exhibition intends to focus on Boag's artworks depicting her own personal experiences with migration, immersed in the deep links and multi-layered relationship between Scotland, Korea and Australia.

The exhibition will focus on a selection of Yvonne Boag's works that connect and emphasise the relationship between the painted surface of her paintings and the intimacy of her prints, drawings and artist's books. The works selected include recent works from South Korea.






