
Operation Art Touring 50 Exhibition (Cowra Library)

SIXTY: The Journal of Australian Ceramics (JAC) 60th Anniversary 1962-2022

The Journal of Australian Ceramics (JAC) has over its sixty years of print publication, presented the history of ceramics, in Australia. It has acknowledged the achievements of so many in that time, as well as educating readers on the importance and position of ceramics within Australian art.

The exhibition brought together works by twenty-two Australian ceramic artists to celebrate the significant anniversary in the history of the Journal of Australian Ceramics (JAC). *SIXTY* was an exciting opportunity to experience an exhibition of works by some of Australia's finest and most awarded ceramic artists (including local potter Greg Daly) who have played a major role in shaping the history and future directions of ceramic arts practice in Australia.

For sixty years, the JAC has documented the achievements of many artists, writers and practitioners, while educating readers on the positioning of ceramics within the context of Australian art. Contributors have predominantly been artists who variously have taken on roles as collaborator, contributor, curator, educator, mentor, pioneer, scientist, and speaker, in order to present a balanced viewpoint while passing on skills and knowledge to future generations of ceramicists. *SIXTY* is an Australian Design Centre *On Tour* exhibition project that is presented in partnership with The Australian Ceramics Association and Visions Australia.



Red Heart of Australia was an exhibition that showcased eight paintings of national importance created by Aboriginal artists from across Central Australia united by the colour red.

These precious works from the National Museum of Australia's collection show how the colour red expresses relationships to Country, family, ritual and spirituality. It's the colour of the desert, the giant rock Uluru in central Australia, and the colour of a blazing sunset over the water.

The exhibition was also presented as part of a cultural exchange program by the National Museum of Australia with the National Art Museum of China (NAMOC), Beijing in 2021.

RED HEART Red Heart of Australia is an exhibition of eight paintings on canvas of national importance from the National Museum of Australia 's (NMA) collection, created by Aboriginal artists from across Central Australia.

The selection of artworks, curated by Adjunct Professor Margo Neale, Senior Indigenous Curator NMA demonstrate how the colour red is used to express the artists' relationship to Country, to family and their spirituality. The exhibition includes a five-minute video presentation by the curator

Artists include Anatjari Tjakamarra, Ronnie Tjampitjinpa, Charlie Wallabi, Keith Stevens, David Miller, Yanjimi Peter Rowlands, Pukarlyi Milly Kelly and Hayley Atkins, and, Kunmanara (Nellie) Stewart.

UTOPIA BATIKS: Textile Artworks from the Utopia Collection Bequest

The Utopia Batik Collection is an archive of assembled pieces by some of Australia's most prominent artists of the Eastern Anmatyerre and Alyawarre people, centred at the remote community of Utopia, 270 kms north east of Alice Springs.

First introduced into the Utopia community in the 1970s, Batik was largely adopted by women in the community who used the wax resist technique to depict the layered nature of Tjukurrpa stories – surface and hidden knowledge. Over time the batik technique of layering, was adopted by artists in their painting to create artworks distinctive to the Utopia community of artists.

The Utopia Batik Collection Bequest housed at the Tamworth Regional Gallery has developed since 1998 as a cultural collaboration between Utopia batik artists and the Gallery culminating in the bequest of a significant body of archival artwork including batiks, prints, paintings, and sculpture known as the Utopia Collection Bequest. 

LITTLE NOTHINGS: Shani Nottingham

LITTLE NOTHINGS: Shani Nottingham was an exhibition of mixed media works by multi-disciplinary Cowra artist Shani Nottingham, highlighting the environmental impact of the prevalence of single-use plastics. Nottingham collects, reclaims and transforms bread-tags which bloom to become something 'other' and states:

"As small mundane and usually overlooked pieces of single-use plastic, bread-tags are an abundant waste material. I reclaim and transform this product, moving past their initial purpose and life span to become something 'other' that has value and meaning, provoking response and creating a space for dialogue about plastic pollution. These bread-tags (over one million seen at the exhibition) have been saved and sent to me from people all over Australia and the world, as part of my ongoing work for 'The Breadtag Project'."







CALLEEN ART AWARD 2023

28 July 2023 Finalists Selection



The annual Calleen Art Award is an exciting and stimulating art award and one of the most respected and richest regional art prizes in New South Wales, worth \$25,000 in 2023. The Calleen Art Award was founded in 1977 by Cowra art patron and collector Mrs Patricia Fagan, OAM. The Calleen Art Award is an acquisitive art prize with the winning work joining the Calleen Collection - the Gallery's foundation collection - a unique collection celebrating previous winners of contemporary art works of high-quality and of regional and national significance.

This year the Gallery received 278 entries and 57 works were selected as finalists by the selection panel of art professionals. The selected artworks comprised a diverse range of visually compelling, thoughtful and challenging paintings.

The Calleen Art Award 2023 selection panel was the Award Judge Kon Gouriotis OAM, Curator, Writer and Editor of Artist Profile Magazine, Alexandra Pedley, Gallery Director (Acting), Bathurst Regional Art Gallery and Brian Langer, panel chair and Gallery Director, Cowra Regional Art Gallery. The panel selection of finalists took place on 28 July.

The winner was announced by the Award Judge Kon Gouriotis OAM at the Calleen Art Award 2023 opening, Saturday 7 October 2023

26 August to 1 October 2023

Robyn Stacey: as still as life

Robyn Stacey: as still as life was an exhibition of photography that explored the tantalising world of the still-life tradition. The main focus of the exhibition consisted of a series of large scale monumental and magnificent photographs by the renowned Australian artist Robyn Stacey drawn from the Museum of Australian Photography (MAPh) Collection.

Still life is one of the most enduring genres that flourished during the 17th-century Baroque period in Europe. Inanimate objects took on symbolic meaning, creating a type of code through which status and narrative could be communicated. Still life reflected, responded to and shaped society, changing and democratising the art market into what it is today.

Still life was the perfect subject matter for photographers to focus on during the medium's infancy. Inanimate, unmoving objects could be composed in elaborate and dynamic compositions within a controlled environment, allowing for the long exposures that photography demanded. Still life through photography has continued to evolve, from compositions that mimicked Baroque paintings, through to highly conceptual and experimental works that reflect, respond and speak to contemporary society.

Other eminent artists in the exhibition were Katthy Cavaliere, Olive Cotton, Max Dupain, Joachim Froese, Christine Godden, Janina Green, Fiona Hall, Penelope Malone, David Moore, George J Morris, Michael Riley and Anne Zahalka.

The entire MFF23 program is only 90 minutes long, screened in two parts with an interval, with films ranging in duration from one to ten minutes.

Hand-makers wrangle with their creative process, traditions, materials, and tools to produce a form that is as individual as they are.
